November Avila Gathering

Rev. Mark Latkovich, President-Rector, Borromeo Seminary and Saint Mary Seminary, related his vocation story. The night before his First Communion, he realized God was calling him to the priesthood. Father grew up in a faith-filled family who did not question his early vocation. When they relocated from Pennsylvania to the Cleveland diocese, he attended Borromeo seminary high school. He has spent 27 years of his priesthood at the seminary where 97 men currently are in formation.

"All their vocations are brought forth first by the Lord and then cultivated by people like the Avilas," Father said. He explained that an individual hears an inner call to the priesthood or religious life, but other people affirm it. He described incidents that occurred when he was still a seminarian, such as the time a stranger sitting behind him at Mass suddenly asked if he had considered becoming a priest. Father emphasized that no vocation is static. Not only does a vocation evolve, but also it needs continuous fortification and nurturing. He thanked the Avilas for praying for vocations and for adopting individual priests and "entering a spiritual solidarity with them." Although he couldn't know whether or not his own anonymous Prayer Mom was present, Father expressed gratitude for her prayers, and for her encouraging notes on his birthday, Christmas, Easter and the anniversary of his ordination. Fr. Latkovich also described his deep appreciation for his priesthood. "A vocation is a gift," he said. "The best way to receive it is to be grateful for it."

DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE LEGAL PROTECTION OF UNBORN CHILDREN



The United States Council of Catholic Bishops has declared January 22, 2019, a Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children.

It is important to look at the staggering statistics. It is estimated that there have been over 1.72 billion abortions worldwide in the past 40 years. There are approximately 2550 abortions done in the United States each day. As of 2017, there were about 700 abortion facilities in the United States. Women in their 20's account for the majority of abortions.

We can help change this trend of evil if every Christian fully embraces life in Jesus Christ and reflects His truth and love. We are all called to speak the truth in love and with respect and calmness about the sacredness and dignity of every human being. Imagine how many souls might be lost because of our silence with such topics as contraception and abortion. If we meet a woman who has chosen abortion, we must reassure her that she can be healed through God's love and mercy. We are all made in the image and likeness of Jesus. These women are often bearing the burden of overwhelming pressures, sometimes from their own families. Speak of the value of adoption. The Church cares just as deeply for the unborn as She does for the born.

Pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament for all pregnant women and the children they bear. Pray for all those women who are contemplating abortion. Dedicate a Rosary to the end of this tragic and complex evil. Perhaps some day our society will listen to the words of Isaiah when he said, "Turn not your back on your own flesh."

FEAST OF THE CHAIR OF ST. PETER

February 22 is the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter. In Matthew 16, we are reminded about the time when Jesus asked His disciples who did people say the Son of Man was. The apostles answered, but Peter said, "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Jesus replied, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I shall build My Church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it ... Whatever you bind on earth shall bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

How awesome the responsibilities Jesus gave to His priests, yet how demanding and sobering these are. The duties of a parish priest include presiding at Mass, giving blessings, proclaiming and explaining the Gospel, anointing the sick and absolving sinners, all which build up a community of faith.

What would we do without our priests? Who would say Mass? Who would consecrate the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ? Who would forgive our sins in Jesus' name? Who would counsel us in accordance with Church teaching and with the Catechism? Who would prepare us for our final days here on earth?

We often take our priests for granted. Yes, we should pray for them, but here are some specific ways to pray and a few other suggestions:

- Pray for wisdom, discernment and for God's will for our priests.
- Pray for courage and strength so that they can continue to live out their vocation in the midst of a culture that is often non-supportive.
- Pray for hope and pray against discouragement; often our priests don't see the fruits of their labors.
- Offer a Mass for them; we can offer Masses for the living as well as the deceased!

Tell your priest that you are praying for him, and ask him how you can best support him. Inviting a priest to your home can be a great blessing, not necessarily for dinner, but just for coffee and desert; consider asking one or two other couples from the parish to join you. Come to your priest with solutions, not just complaints or "suggestions," or volunteer to be part of the solution.



Jesus, we thank you for our holy priests. Sanctify them, give them the graces to seek in their lives only Your holy will and Your glory. Keep them strong in their love for You, renew their courage in the midst of their difficulties, accompany them in their loneliness and grant all of their needs. Send Your Holy Spirit to enlighten them. Blessed Mother, wrap your mantle of protection around them always. Amen.
