Tresident's Corner "Pray and do not lose heart" - Luke 18:1-8



Bishop Sheen advices us that "The power of our prayer is not found in the words we speak but in lifting the mind and heart to God. He also said, "Prayer is a battle that takes effort." St. Padre Pio also speaks about prayer: "Prayer must come before everything; never tire of prayer. We become weak without it. Prayer brings us peace." Our patron, St. Teresa of Avila, tells us, "... be occupied with prayer for those who are defenders of the Church and for preachers and learned men who protect her from attack."

Today more than ever we need to be occupied with prayer as there are many battles going on all around us. Our Church is under attack along with many of the freedoms we are blessed with in our country. Due to the Corona virus many people are dying alone and without the Sacraments, people are paralyzed with fear, there is division all around us and the battle for souls is raging. There is also a battle for the family. Sister Lucia said that Our Lady told her at Fatima that the last battle would be for the family. In the midst of all that is going on, we can take heart in what St. Paul tells us in Romans 8:37: "... in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us." Jesus loves us and is with us. He has given us His Church, the Sacraments and the gifts of faith and prayer. He has given us Mary as our Mother, His Holy Word in the Scriptures and the Power of the Holy Spirit. Our Lady has given us the Rosary. We have everything we need. So, let's take up the battle of prayer and continue to press on and not lose heart.

Prayer takes work and determination and we often struggle to be faithful to our daily personal prayer and to our call as Avila's to faithfully pray for priests. St. Teresa of Avila herself struggled with prayer, as we often do. However, when she struggled, she did not lose heart or give up, rather she followed the directive of her spiritual director and prayed to the Holy Spirit. Scripture tell us in Romans 8:26 that the Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness for we do not know how to pray as we ought and we are assured that the Spirit always comes to our aid. In the power of the Holy Spirit, St. Teresa persevered and continued to pray even in the most difficult moments of her life. She said, "We must have a determined determination to never give up prayer." She knew the importance and power of pray so she did not give up or lose heart, but continued on with determination in spite of difficulties.

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The Holy Spirit desires to help us and to give us that same determination to battle in prayer. All we have to do is ask. We certainly can't persevere and be faithful to prayer with our own strength, but, like St. Teresa, we can call on the power of the Holy Spirit and the help of the prayers of the Communion of Saints. We are surrounded by a cloud of witnesses so that together we can continue to pray in the most difficult situations, push back the powers of darkness and will be enabled to always rejoice in our hope, be patient in tribulation and persevere in prayer. With Jesus and the help of the Holy Spirit, we have strength for everything.

As Avilas, our main purpose is our call to pray for vocations, for the priesthood and for those in religious life. Persevering in our weekly Holy Hour before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is of utmost importance. St. Teresa knew the importance of praying for priests and that is why she made prayer for the priesthood a duty of her Carmelite community. They were all "... occupied with prayer for those who are defenders of the Church and for preachers and learned men who protect her from attack." In imitation of our patron, St. Teresa, we, too, need to be occupied with prayer. Prayer must be our life, our passion and the most important thing that we do.

Although we have not been able to meet together regularly for our Avila mornings of prayer, we know that we are of one heart and mind, praying together wherever we are, knowing that God is hearing our prayers and is moving and working for good in ways that we do not see. So, together, wherever we are, let us ask St. Teresa of Avila, the Blessed Mother, St, Joseph, and all the Saints to pray with us and for us as we ask the Spirit of God to assist us in our prayer. As we rely on the Holy Spirit, we will become more humble, more joyful, more peaceful, more faithful and more determined to persevere. Praying for priests is a privilege and a duty. Let us pray for each other that we take this duty more seriously than ever before as we pray Sacred Heart of Jesus, send us priests, send us many priests, send us Holy priests. May we all love Jesus more and more everyday and in the Power of the Holy Spirit make Him known and loved. Lord willing, we will be together in September.

ST. PHILOMENA, POWERFUL WITH GOD

The Church celebrates the feast of St. Philomena on August 11. Her remains were discovered in 1802 in the Catacomb of Priscilla where the skeleton of a female between the ages of 13 and15 was found. Embedded in the cement was a small glass phial with what was taken to be blood. In the assumptions of the time, the remains were taken to be those of a virgin martyr named Philomena. Her remains were moved to the Church of our Lady of Grace in Mugnano del Cardinale August 10, 1805 and were placed in the Church of Our Lady of Grace. Several miracles were attributed to her, and she subsequently became the focus of widespread devotion. In 1833, a Neopolitan nun from Naples reported that the saint appeared to her in a vision, revealing Philomena was a Greek princess who was martyred at the age of 13 years by Diocletian, a Roman Emperor from 284 to 305, because she had taken a vow as a consecrated virgin and refused to marry the emperor. She also revealed that her birthday was January 10, that her martyrdom occurred on August 10 (the date also of the arrival of her relics in Mugnano del Cardinale) and that her name "Filumena" meant "daughter of light."

The spread of devotion to St. Philomena in France as well as in Italy was helped when St. John Vianney built a shrine in her honor and referred to her often, attributing to her the miracles that others attributed to himself. The cure of the near-dying Pauline Jaricot, founder of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, at Philomena's shrine on August 10, 1835, also promoted devotion to the saint. Another miracle of Giovanna Cescutti took place on July 6, 1835, in Venice. St. Damien of Molokai had strong devotion to St. Philomena, naming his church at Kalawao in her honor. Many other saints were devoted to her, including St. Peter Julian Eymard, St. Peter Chanel, St. Anthony Mary Claret, St. Madelaine Sophie Barat, St. Mary Euphrasier Pelletier, St. John Nepomucene Neumann, St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, St. Pius X, St. Padre Pio and Blessed Anna Maria Taigi.

St. Philomena is the patron saint of infants, babies and youth.
